

How can potential employers assist IEPTs?

- Due to privacy policies, The Alliance is unable to disclose any information about a past, present or potential credentialing applicant. If you wish to communicate with The Alliance about an applicant's file or on behalf of an applicant, the applicant must first complete an Authorization Letter which can be downloaded from our website at www.alliancept.org
- The Alliance has agreements with some physiotherapy programs from which multiple credentialing applications are received. For example, some universities may send documents to our office electronically in order to facilitate the IEPT's application process. Please contact The Alliance to determine if there is a current agreement with an IEPT's physiotherapy program.

- It is important to understand that The Alliance strongly encourages applicants **to avoid taking action** (e.g. accepting employment, moving, etc.) in anticipation of a positive credentialing result or a result within a specific time period.

Who must be credentialed?

Individuals educated outside Canada who wish to practice physiotherapy in Yukon Territory or any province (except Quebec) must have their educational credentials and qualifications assessed by The Canadian Alliance of Physiotherapy Regulators (The Alliance) in order to be eligible to take the Physiotherapy Competency Exam (PCE). **There are no exceptions to this requirement.**

What is credentialing?

The credentialing process determines if the education and qualifications of an internationally educated physiotherapist (IEPT) are substantially equivalent to those of a Canadian educated physiotherapist. The requirements are based on the minimum academic and clinical practice components of accredited Canadian physiotherapy programs.

Substantially equivalent is the term used to describe the educational credentials and qualifications of an IEPT which are highly similar to those of a Canadian educated physiotherapist.

What documentation is required?

Credentialing applicants must provide **authentic documentation** to support their:

- level of education (university level) at a
- recognized educational institution and university level physiotherapy

education at entry level

- general, professional and clinical education. If the applicant's physiotherapy credential is a graduate entry level program [e.g. an entry level Master's degree in physiotherapy], the prior studies are also evaluated as being part of the studies leading to the physiotherapy qualifications.
- knowledge of the context of physiotherapy practice in Canada
- eligibility for membership or registration as a physiotherapist in the country of education
- French or English language proficiency

How long does it take to complete credentialing?

Credentialing assessments can take anywhere from 4 to 22 weeks **from the time that all required documents are received.**

If an applicant's program of education is new to the equivalency review process, or if we have implemented new credentialing standards, detailed research is required which will require extra time. These files are referred to as non-precedent files.

Approximately 418 applications were processed in 2009. It took an average of 8.5 weeks to complete precedent files – the published standard is 12 – 14 weeks. It took an average of 20 weeks to complete non-precedent files – the published standard is 20 – 22 weeks.

What are the outcomes of the credentialing process?

The possible **outcomes** of the credentialing assessment include determination of:

- substantial equivalence – applicants are eligible for the exam – this is valid for 2 years
- minor gaps in credentials – applicants are eligible for Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR) – they have 2 years to fulfill requirements
- major gaps in credentials – applicants are referred to Canadian Physiotherapy programs



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
